I have had a wonderful time working on Art, it's such an intelligent and witty play, both touching and harsh, dealing with the question; "Are we who we think we are or are we who our friends think we are?" The writer, Yasmina Reza has an amazing track record; her works have all been multi-award-winning critical and popular international

successes. Her plays have been produced worldwide and translated into thirty-five languages. She has also written several books and a screenplay.

I really like her style of dialogue; its rhythm's and repetition are very musical.

Christopher Hampton wrote his first play at the age of eighteen. Since then, his plays have included The Philanthropist, Savages and Les Liaisons Dangereuses. He has translated plays by Ibsen, Moliere and Chekhov.

He has also written for television and film: some of which he has himself directed. I am very fond of his work.



Most recently, he appeared as Richard Greenleaf in *The Talented Mr Ripley* and as Antonio in *The Duchess of Malfi*. Film credits include *The Door* (2005) directed by Gareth Edwards.
